18th Sunday in Ordinary Time "BREAD THAT SATISFIES"




If we but open our eyes we will be amazed at the bountifulness of the nourishment provided for us. We will discover that there is more than we will ever need; that God is magnanimous, even prodigal in giving; that God's generosity exceeds all our expectations and also our understanding. So often, the hunger we experience is really dissatisfaction. Because we want richer fare, we overlook the simple yet substantial bread within our reach.

A second characteristic of this bread should not be overlooked. It comes to us in a community of disciples. We are nourished by God through the ministry of one another. Again, this happens through very simple actions: distributing bread and gathering up the fragments; visiting the sick and consoling the grieving; caring for a child and giving aid to an elder; bagging groceries and directing a choir. If we but open our eyes we will be astounded at how ordinary actions can satisfy our hunger and the hunger of others.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 55:1-3

Hasten and eat.

Thus says the Lord: "Everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price.

"Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread and your labour for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food.

"Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live. I will make with you an everlasting covenant, my steadfast, sure love for David."

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Ps 144:8-9, 15-18, R, v16,

SECOND READING: Romans 8:35, 37-39

No creature can separate us from the love of God: which is in Christ.

Brothers and sister: Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us.

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor Angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

GOSPEL: Matthew 14:13-2

They all ate and were satisfied.

When Jesus heard that Herod had beheaded John the Baptist, he withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore, Jesus saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick.

When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me."

Then Jesus ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds.

St Ignatius of Loyola Feast Day: July 31

St. Ignatius Loyola was born in 1491, one of 13 children of a family of minor nobility in northern Spain. As a young man Ignatius Loyola was inflamed by the ideals of courtly love and knighthood and dreamed of doing great deeds.

But in 1521 Ignatius was gravely wounded in a battle with the French. While recuperating, Ignatius Loyola experienced a conversion. Reading the lives of Jesus and the saints made Ignatius happy and aroused desires to do great things. Ignatius realized that these feelings were clues to God's direction for him.

Over the years, Ignatius became expert in the art of spiritual direction. He collected his insights, prayers, and suggestions in his book the *Spiritual Exercises*, one of the most influential books on the spiritual life ever written. With a small group of friends, Ignatius Loyola founded the Society of Jesus, or the Jesuits. Ignatius conceived the Jesuits as "contemplatives in action." This also describes the many Christians who have been touched by Ignatian spirituality.


VOLUNTEER DRIVER REQUIRED

PARISH PROCEDURES DURING COVID-19

NSW GOVT CURRENT RULES:

- Maximum number of people at a religious gathering is 100, subject to the 4 square metre rule.
 - Family members from the same household are allowed to sit together.
- Maximum number of mourners at a funeral is 100.
- Maximum number of guests at a wedding is 150.
- Community gatherings and meetings may continue with a maximum of 20 participants.
- People attending religious services are required to provide their name and contact details upon entering the church, for contract tracing purposes.
- A COVID-safe plan must be developed, and organisation must register as a COVID-safe community.

BOOKINGS FOR MASS:

- If you have already made a permanent booking, you do not need to book in again.
 - Please notify the parish office otherwise, if you WILL NOT be attending Mass on a particular weekend.

- Sacrament of Reconciliation is available on Saturday mornings after the 9.00am Mass OR by appointment.
- For funerals, meeting rooms bookings etc, please contact the parish office.

ARRIVING FOR MASS:

- Please wash your hands with soap and water before you leave your house.
- Register/ sign off your name(s) when you enter the church.
- Sanitise your hands.
- Maintain social distancing at all times.
- Families living in the same household are allowed to sit together.
- Congregational singing is discouraged.
- Collection plate will not be passed around. A volunteer will walk around each row to collect any donation.
- Holy Communion will only be distributed on the hands.
- If available, please help with cleaning/ wiping down seats after Mass.
- As much as we enjoy gathering outside after Mass, may we ask, during this time, you do not congregate outside.

Dispensation for Sunday Mass obligation still applies.

If you have visited any of the "hotspots" identified by the NSW Government, OR are experiencing flu-like symptoms, please do not come to church! Immediately self isolate, monitor your symptoms and get tested as the health officials advise.

TIPS FOR FAMILY PRAYER

SACRED SPACE: A PLACE FOR PRAYER - Create a small prayer space of your family room. Place on it a crucifix, bible, candle, and an image of Mary. Change the colour of the altar cloth to match the liturgical season, e.g. purple for Advent and Lent, white for Easter and Christmas, green for Ordinary Time and red for Pentecost.

PLAN - the best time of day, best place, and best way of involving all.

CONSISTENCY - stick with the pattern that works.

AGE APPROPRIATE - encourage responsibility in older children for younger ones, give younger ones roles they can play.

SYMBOLS - candle, family bible, icon crucifix, photo of someone being prayed for—whatever works best for your family.

REGULAR PATTERN – e.g. 'Thank You', 'Sorry', and 'Please Help Me' prayers, Traditional prayers (explain their origins, meaning).

They ride around on their bicycles and scooters and wear name tags because they don't know who they are anymore. They go to a building called a wreck centre, but they must have got it fixed because it is all okay now. They do exercises there, but they don't do them very well. There is a swimming pool too, but they all jump up and down in it with hats on.

At their gate, there is a doll house with a little old man sitting in it. He watches all day so nobody can escape. Sometimes they sneak out, and go cruising in their golf carts!

Nobody there cooks, they just eat out. And, they eat the same thing every night —- early birds.

Some of the people can't get out past the man in the doll

Some of the people can't get out past the man in the doll house. The ones who do get out, bring food back to the wrecked centre for pot luck.

My Grandma says the Grandpa worked all his life to earn his retardment and says I should work hard so I can be retarded someday too.

When I earn my retardment, I want to be the man in the doll house. Then I will let people out, so they can visit their grandchildren.

Duties may include: welcoming visitors, answering phone and taking messages, data entry, filing.



Mary Mackillop was born in Melbourne (Australia) in 1842. Died in Sydney on this day, August 8, in 1909. Took the religious name Mary of the Cross. Responding to the isolation of colonial families, she pioneered a new form of religious life to provide education for their children. She and her new sisters shared the life of the poor and the itinerant, offering special care to destitute women and children. Remembered for her eagerness to discover God's will in all things, for her charity in the face of calumny, and for her abiding trust in God's providence. She was named Australia's second patron in 2013.
